- D. Displays should be more detailed in explanation than a poster. They must be 3-dimensional and include articles to assist in explanation.
- E. Any item intended for hanging should have 2 holes punched near the top or other applicable hanger affixed to the back.

 - g. Typed Transcript of Public Speech written to support your Citizenship Project
 - h. Personal Journal reflecting what you learned during the Citizenship Project
 - i. Any Other Communication item created by you to support your group's Citizenship Project
 - j. Poster illustrating or promoting a 4-H Community Service Project
